HANDLER RETURNS TO DOG “AROUND” TO THE LEFT SIDE OF THE DOG BACK TO HEEL POSITION

This is done on all 3 stays.

Now we sit dog, tell to stay while you gently step right in front of them. Use your hand in front of their face as you step in front. (this gently reminds them to stay in position).

The dog should be staying in position as you return. Hold leash high to the back of the neck so it does not get tangled in his legs or tight as you walk around back to heel position.

SIT STAY: Build to 1 to 1-1/2 minutes. Increase distance to 6 feet very gradually.

DOWN STAY: Build to 1 1/2 minutes. Increase distance to 6 feet very gradually.

STAND STAY: Build to 1/2 minute.

PITFALLS: Distance too far

Distraction too much

Duration keeping the dog waiting too long

Training sessions are too long, Keep short working on one or two things.

QUICK SITS AND QUICK DOWNS WHILE HEELING

Take 3-4-5 steps and while stopping say sit, repeat 5 or 6 times. Dog will learn to automatically sit as you stop.

Take 5-8 steps and down the dog. Repeat several times.

CIRCLES

CIRCLE LEFT This is a complete 360 degree circle about a hula hoop size so that you end up going in the same direction you were in when you started.

CIRCLE RIGHT This is a complete 360 degree turn to the right. You may need to encourage the dog to keep up with you. Food/toy works well here.

CANINE SAFETY IN THE HOME

It's best to be prepared for an accident or emergency before it happens.

Have you ever considered:

Who will take care of your dog if you are hurt and unable to do so?

What would your family do if your dog was hurt?

What will happen to your dog should you have a fatal accident?

A little work in advance will provide your dog with proper care no matter what happens

POISONOUS PRODUCTS

There are several household products that are dangerous to your dogs. If your dog ingests any of these harmful chemicals, contact poison control center or your veterinarian immediately.

Check your cabinet doors. Fix loose doors or doors that are easily opened by your dog.

Lock up prescription and non-prescription medicines, vitamins, anti-freeze, bleach, cleaners, polish, wax, detergents, rat poison, insecticides, toilet cleaners.

To prevent accidents:

Keep items with warning labels away from your dog.

Teach children that all these items are poisonous to them and to their animals. Household products should not be played with and should not be used on pets.
